INTRODUCTION

StoryBox English curriculum for grades K-6 is a distinctly personalized, multimedia learning approach to delivering engaging instruction to English Language Learners (ELLs). The curriculum is rooted in a foundation of pedagogical theories and frameworks aimed at advancing the proficiency of English language learning through hands-on, innovative educational methodologies. Yet, the curriculum is not merely theoretical; it is the product of decades practical of teaching experience within its content team, individuals who have dedicated their professional careers to teaching English to non-native speakers. StoryBox English is built on the Science of Reading, ensuring a strong literacy foundation through phonemic awareness, phonics, vocabulary, fluency, and comprehension but uses the Whole Language Approach, which emphasizes language acquisition through a natural combination of listening, speaking, reading, and writing, rather than acquiring individual and disconnected reading skills.

StoryBox English utilizes its proprietary patented technologies to deliver personalized learning that adapts to the learner's own cognitive development using spiral learning theory, which posits that revisiting topics over time leads to better long-term retention of information. Using constructivist principles, learners their knowledge through customized, adaptive content. In addition, the interactive design of the workbooks and companion app demonstrate commitment a scientifically informed, multisensory learning. Specifically, StoryBox English embraces the principles of the Orton-Gillingham approach and VAKT learning styles, ensuring a multisensory instructional method that activates visual, auditory, and tactile learning techniques. By applying well-established educational frameworks, StoryBox English provides a sensory-rich learning experience acknowledges the varied preferences of ELLs, promoting a deeper and more enduring grasp of the English language. The curriculum employs an array of digital tools and mediumsranging from interactive apps to Alenhanced activities—each designed to meet the diverse learning needs of the 21st-century student. The integrated use of technology, narratives, and multisensory learning promotes active engagement with digital content, which contributes to the development of essential digital and media literacy skills, preparing them for

success in a technology-driven world.

At the heart of StoryBox English lies a commitment to continual evolution and excellence in ELL education, ensuring that learners receive the most effective and engaging instruction possible.

The design review that follows is not limited to one specific aspect of the StoryBox English curriculum, but instead, evaluates the product from an instructional design perspective that includes the program design framework, content selection, design, and development, evaluation, and interface.

DESIGN REVIEW

PROGRAM DESIGN & FRAMEWORK

The program design clearly specifies a systemic Theory of Action (or Logic Model).

The StoryBox English curriculum has established a comprehensive Logic Model that clearly articulates a problem statement, the inputs (activities), and the outputs (short- intermediate- and long-term outcomes) that align with the program framework. For this reason, this criterion was assigned a rating of "Strong". For further reference, the StoryBox English Curriculum logic model has been included in the appendix of this report.

A systematic design process was used to develop, evaluate, and refine materials.

Curriculum developers gathered data from a needs analysis that sought input from educators, language and education experts, and learners. Using this insight, the objectives were revised using an iterative process that continuously evaluated their relevance and effectiveness. The systematic design process for developing the StoryBox English curriculum was careful and

procedural. A content team continues to evaluate and refine materials for improvement. A rating of "Strong" has been assigned to this criterion.

PROGRAM CONTENT SELECTION & DESIGN

The program design addresses specified instructional/curriculum needs.

StoryBox English curriculum is aligned with the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) and with international English learning standards. In addition, the content satisfies test preparation for nation-wide standardized tests including ACCESS for ELLs (Assessing Comprehension and Communication in State-to-State English Language Learners), the Language Proficiency Assessments for California (ELPAC), and the Texas English Language Proficiency Assessment System (TELPAS). The curriculum uses practical sentences and authentic expressions that reflect Piaget's stages of cognitive development, which posits that revisiting topics over time leads to better long-term retention of information. This criterion has been given a rating of "Strong".



A comprehensive design plan uses a needs analysis to identify and articulate instructional objectives, strategies, and methods to meet specific curricular needs. StoryBox English has conducted a needs analysis that informed the development of materials, and formative and summative evaluations continue to be administered to refine program development. This criterion has been given a rating of "Strong".

The program design addresses individual learner needs for high achievement.

StoryBox English curriculum addresses individual learner needs in ELL programs by combining initial assessments of learners, adaptive learning technologies, a diverse range of instructional materials, and additional support features, all enhanced by continuous feedback. Learners complete an initial assessment of prior knowledge upon entering the program; the results then determine the personalized learning path that are aligned with learner needs. differentiated instructional strategies, StoryBox English caters to a wide range of learner abilities and preferences. This criterion has been given a rating of "Strong".

Instructional objectives are systematically developed and clearly specified.

Initial instructional objectives were revisited and then revised as the design progress progressed. These revisions stemmed from the results of the formative evaluations that were conducted. To ensure that the objectives are aligned with the evolving needs of learners, they are continuously monitored and evaluated for refinement. This criterion has been given a rating of "Strong".

Instructional sequencing is aligned with objectives and adaptive to learner needs.

English StoryBox curriculum adaptive, personalized learning approach to instruction and is responsive to individual learner needs. This approach is exemplified in the print and digital formats, where the Whole Language Approach is used to emphasize the importance of integrating listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills in a natural and meaningful way. workflow is stressed during reading and is practiced until it activities becomes routine for the learner, but the possibility for both small group and individualized learning formats ensure that flexibility remains. This criterion has been given a rating of "Strong".

PROGRAM EVALUATION

Formative evaluation was used to develop and refine the program.

StoryBox English regularly collects learner feedback about their experiences and makes necessary adjustments to the program. This includes modifying learning materials, offering additional support in certain areas, and providing more advanced resources for high-achieving learners looking for additional challenges. Formative evaluations are implemented cyclically and involve small-scale testing sessions that observe, survey, interview learners and teachers. This feedback focused on various aspects of the materials, such as cultural relevance, language appropriateness, engagement levels, and educational effectiveness. For instance, if a certain folktale was not resonating well with students from a specific cultural background, developers would either modify the tale or replace it with a more suitable one. This criterion has been given a rating of "Strong".

Summative evaluation was used to obtain evidence on program effectiveness.

The internal assessment team in collaboration with an external educational

research organization has conducted a comprehensive summarize evaluation to ensure objectivity and rigor. The evaluation was designed to measure the effectiveness, impact, and overall quality of the program materials. Areas of special focus included improvements in language skills among learners, material suitability for different learning levels, and the cultural appropriateness of the content. This criterion has been given a rating of "Strong".

MATERIALS / INTERFACE DESIGN

Costs and resources needed for using the program are clearly specified.

Detailed pricing information is disclosed once a demonstration has been given. This approach allows StoryBox English sales development specialists to provide customized information based on the specific needs of each client. Pricing models typically are structured on a perstudent basis and discounted rates are given to early adopter clients, especially those who provide testimonials or participate in research projects. This criterion is rated "Strong".



The support for users is readily available, and the program content supports eight different languages. For administrators, detailed implementation guides and planning resources are provided; for students, user-friendly materials and interactive learning tools assist them in their language learning. These resources are available in multiple languages and are designed to be inclusive and sensitive to the diverse backgrounds of our learners. A rating of "Strong" is assigned to this criterion.

Students receive clear and relevant feedback about their performance.

StoryBox English curriculum and the associated materials provide engaging content and activities, but feedback is limited in areas. Learners might receive immediate, individualized feedback when using the print materials, but this relies on the teacher, specifically. The companion app does provide tests in which the learner answers questions related to the content. This feedback is in the form of a knowledge of correct responses (KCR) and then supplemented with personalized and constructive feedback. This criterion is rated as "Strong".

Teachers receive assessment data for tracking students' progress.

StoryBox English provides comprehensive teacher dashboard that tracks the progress of each student and overall class. The dashboard tool includes detailed analytics student on performance on specific skills. Teachers administrators can export summarized reports to help understand learner progress and the effectiveness of the program. In addition, parents may access user-friendly "Learning Outcome" reports that display their child's progress and include summaries of assessment results, progress in various language skills, and recommendations for areas improvement. This criterion has been given a rating of "Strong".
